

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Planning



Area A 21 Melville Avenue

Planning permission for two major redevelopments adjacent to each other in Melville Avenue have recently been approved. At 21 Melville Avenue, a proposal to demolish the existing bungalow and erect a three-storey building, plus a lower ground floor level comprising a total of 5 flats, was opposed by more than 20 residents, the CVRA and the local ward Councillor on the grounds that it was an over-development, out of keeping with the area and detrimental to the neighbours. Nevertheless, the full Planning Committee approved the proposal by a 6-4 majority. Late news: The developer has recently submitted a new application increasing the number of flats from 5 to 6.

23 Melville Avenue

Planning permission had been granted

last year to convert and extend the existing house into 5 flats. In May this year, the developers submitted a new application to demolish the existing house entirely and erect a new three storey building comprising 7 flats. Despite the increase in the number of flats, the new proposal was within the footprint of the previous application and the design (as initially submitted) fitted in reasonably well with the overall street scene. As planning permission had previously been granted, the CVRA did not submit an objection, although a number of local residents did so. Long after the deadline for comments had passed, the developer submitted amended plans, making major changes to the appearance of the proposed building. The recycling bins, previously against a side boundary, were moved to the front of the building, thereby replacing the front windows of a ground

floor flat. Just two days after the amended plans were submitted, the Planning Department granted planning permission under its delegated powers, thus denying local residents any opportunity to comment on the amendments. A formal complaint was lodged with the Council whose response was that, in their opinion, the changes were only minor and did not need to be re-notified.

Area B

There are no new planning applications to report.

Area C

29 The Ruffetts

This proposed planning application is for a large single / two storey extension to the front, side and rear of this semi-detached house which your Residents Association objected to based upon among other reasons its scale and size, as did other Residents. This planning application went before the Planning Sub-Committee on the 17th August 2017 however; the Sub-Committee voted to approve the application but added a condition as regards flood risk which is vulnerability in this area.





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

Heathfield and the Riesco Estate

Ramon Francesco Alfredo Riesco, who came to England from Chile and anglicised his forenames to Raymond Francis Alfred, was the last private owner of Heathfield House and its surrounding estate.

The house, its garden, and some other land, are now owned by Croydon Council, the former used as a Council staff training centre, while the garden is now managed as a park open to the public. The Croydon Ecology Centre is also based there. One further part of the estate, Bramley Bank, is also a public open space, owned by Croydon Council and managed by The London Wildlife Trust as a nature reserve. Part of the estate is still farmland, and part was

covered during and after the last war in prefabs, now replaced by the Monks Hill Estate.

When Croydon's Tramlink was planned it was first intended to make a tunnel for the trams from Coombe Lane to Gravel Hill to avoid the need for trams powerful enough to climb to the top of the hill. The Addington end of the tunnel would have been in Heathfield gardens, but fortunately the plans were changed and the gardens survive unscathed.

Riesco made his fortune as an insurance broker, and by the 1920's was living in a house (now replaced by a modern one) on the corner of Melville Avenue and Coombe Road. In or about 1926 he purchased the Heathfield Estate, where he lived in the mansion until his death in 1964. The house accommodated, apart from the Riesco family, his magnificent collection of antique oriental ceramics, and a number of other works of art.

By 1959 Riesco was in discussion with Croydon Council about the future of the house, estate, and ceramics collection. The Council resolved to agree to purchase the house and land (106 acres) for £37,800, and Riesco donated the ceramics to the Council on his death (they were a gift, not a bequest), to form the nucleus of an Arts Centre for Croydon. No such Arts Centre ever materialised. A charitable trust. registered as a charity (216135), was established by the Council 'to enhance the cultural provision' in the Borough, finance the care of the ceramics, and to make provisions for the purchase of additional pieces. The Trust was removed from the register of charities in 1995 as it had 'ceased to exist'. Attempts to find out any more about this Trust have proved unsuccessful.

Nor is the fate of the oriental ceramics a happy story. Of the 650 pieces of rare and valuable porcelain and the like received by Croydon in 1964, there are now 206 left in public ownership, some or all of which can be seen on display in the museum of Croydon's Riesco

Gallery on the ground floor at the central library. Figure provided by Coun. Mike Fisher, when he was the leader of the Council, revealed that 180 pieces were sold in 1970, another 112 in 1984, and a further 24 in 2013 in spite of widespread public protest. Thirty-nine pieces were known to have been 'stolen' but neither Croydon Council nor the Metropolitan Police could throw any light on when the theft occurred, or the results of any investigations. Coun. Fisher's information lacked any account of the other 89 pieces. Thus, some millions of pounds worth of public property had been dispersed, with no Arts Centre to show it in, or indeed to show for it! Instead we have

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Nature Notes: Hedgehogs and the fungal rainbow

Beatrix Potter made hedgehogs famous as Mrs Tiggywinkle and the name has stuck. Hedgehogs' main activity takes place at night possibly because their favourite prey is available at the same time. They feed on slugs, earthworms, beetles, etc and do a useful job when their territory includes a garden. Unfortunately many gardens are enclosed with no way to enter and might be too tidy or too small to sustain a hedgehog which needs to roam over a larger area in its search for sustenance. If there is a possibility to move from one garden to another there is a better chance for survival.

There are many hazards to be avoided. Vehicular traffic is an obvious problem and where hedgehogs are abundant it is not unusual to find deceased individuals. In addition, use of slug pellets in the past has led to sickly and dead animals. There are more natural predators such as foxes and badgers which will eat hedgehogs, particularly when they find a nest of hoglets. In any area where badgers are common there are likely to be very few hedgehogs and since many of the local woodlands have good populations of badgers this must have a negative effect on hedgehog numbers.

In addition, a stressed hedgehog can eat its own youngsters.

While all of these factors can lead to a reduction in sightings of these animals the main cause is probably a lack of suitable interlinked habitats which allow longer nocturnal excursions in search of food or mates, and will also provide more, potentially safe, nesting and hibernating places. I have had a single hedgehog in my garden (on the edge of Selsdon Wood) in the last 47 years and on the few occasions when I have been in the wood in the evening there has been no sign of hog activity. When a male follows a female he emits a curious "chuffing" sound so that he sounds like a miniature steam engine (or perhaps he is just out of breath!).

I would be very interested to hear of any records of sightings, dead or alive, in the local area.

When hedgehogs are thinking of entering hibernation autumn fungi are at the peak of their reproduction cycle. An amazing variety of mushrooms sprout from soil and from dead trees, while bracket and jelly fungi can be found on trees and twigs. The colours of fungi cover a wide range of hue and the selection which follows indicates just a



few of the possibilities. Red (Fly Agaric), Orange (Wrinkled Crust), Yellow (Chicken of the Woods), Green (Green Elfcup), Blue (Cobalt Crust), Purple (Purple Jellydisc), White (White Saddle), Black (Dead Man's Fingers), Brown (Jelly Ear), Pink (Pink Waxcap). As you can see from this limited list fungi can be quite colourful. The shapes are equally varied. Get out to woodland and short grassland and see what you can find!

Autumn. The Friends of Littleheath Woods

As the chill of Winter approaches the leaves on our deciduous trees change colour and drop to the ground after treating us to a firework display of reds and orange. The paths are soon covered with the fallen leaves, a few acorns, some beech mast and possibly sweet chestnuts and hazlenuts. That is, if the local squirrels have not gorged themselves in readiness for the oncoming time of famine. Early Autumn is also time to look for the wild blackberries and crab apples to make into a delicious crumble, pie or tart. Perhaps collect some sweet chestnuts and roast them to eat fresh or prepare them for the freezer to stuff the turkey with at Christmas. Fungi

appear in the grass and path edges, on and under trees, and are a valuable late food source for our woodmice, snails and slugs plus birds, which do not seem to suffer any ill effects.

Are you interested in your children learning a language from a young age? British people are traditionally viewed as not being very good at foreign languages but Joanna, local Croydon Mum, is trying to change that! Formerly a management consultant, Joanna is fluent in Spanish and when she had her daughter in 2015, decided to bring her up bilingually, speaking to her only in Spanish. "I was so surprised when I looked for Spanish clubs and classes for little ones, to find that there weren't any around at all. I am passionate about speaking Spanish, it's one of the greatest pleasures of my life and enabled me to live and work in South America, I really want to share that. It's such a good thing for children to start a language young, they pick it up so easily" Going back to a job where she was away from home five days a week wasn't feasible with a small child, so Joanna started up Spanishtastic to provide Spanish classes for children. Adopting a totally new approach to teaching Spanish to children, from birth to 11 years. The programme is a focussed around 'multi-sensory' learning and encourages children to learn Spanish through songs, games, actions, rhymes, music, drama, handling objects and materials and story-telling.

Studies have shown that learning an

additional language at a young age has multiple short & long term benefits for children including boosting brainpower. Studies also suggest that speaking two or more languages from a very young age helps a child's development into adults with more highly refined cognitive skills. Joanna was reviewed by another local mum -blogger Claire from Totson.co.uk, who declared: "Joanna's approach is a real hit... We loved our taster session and would highly recommend to anyone who's curious about learning a language with their child. It's fun and relaxed, so you and the little ones are absorbing the language as you play." Joanna currently runs classes in Purley and Croydon offering class in venues as well as in local nurseries and schools. 
